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Grant Funding Now Available

At a time when healthcare is being redesigned from every which way, providers, health care administrators, and payers are looking for innovative ways to deliver effective, high quality, high value care that is responsive to the needs of patients and supportive of the structural constraints in which providers practice on a daily basis.

<u>CenteringPregnancy</u> is an evidence-based model of prenatal care that has been documented to improve



birth outcomes, including low birth weight, while enhancing the experience of care for mothers and their loved ones. By engaging women who, are due at similar times, in a group that meets at regular times throughout their pregnancy, prenatal care becomes more holistic and encompasses in-depth education and valuable social support, in addition to individualized competent clinical care. Centering Pregnancy mothers report higher levels of prenatal knowledge, experience lower cesarean rates, breastfeed for longer, and are highly satisfied with their care.

Many sites implementing Centering Pregnancy are now exploring the opportunity to offer <u>CenteringParenting</u> as a way to more efficiently and effectively care for the mother-baby dyad during the first year postpartum. The <u>US Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality (AHRQ)</u> has included both models in their online Innovation Exchange Center which features healthcare innovations that improve quality and reduce disparities.

Thanks to the generous support of the Anthem Foundation, the Chapter will continue its partnership with the Hospital of Central Connecticut's CenteringPregnancy program through June 2016 and is now looking for a second site to implement CenteringPregnancy-related activities during the year 2016. The details and timeline of the new CenteringPregnancy Request for Proposal (RFP) can be found here.

In an effort to further explore the CenteringPregnancy model, interested parties are invited to attend the <u>Northeast Centering Symposium</u> on November 12, 2015 in Waltham, MA where representatives from the March of Dimes and Centering Healthcare Institute will be in attendance and looking forward to engaging with potential grantees. Participants will also be able to meet with colleagues from other sites who are currently implementing the model.

On October 15th, Pregnancy and Infant Loss Remembrance Day, we invite everyone to light a candle at 7pm in honor of your precious babies.




How Can You Make a Difference This November?
